WHAT WE DO

Anyone who knows Corbridge well would agree that it is an exceptional village – a beautiful, thriving, accessible, family-orientated country village with outstanding cultural, social, shopping, transport and educational facilities.

It is also the product of more than 2,500 years of human habitation. Much of its unique appeal lies in the history you can read at every turn, written in Saxon lanes and Roman stone, medieval 'pants' and place names, coaching inns, cottages and Georgian elegance, the three-dimensional record of 20 centuries of development, expansion, disaster, decline, recovery and prosperity.



The Corbridge Village Trust was established in 1965 by residents who were determined to preserve the character of the village, and promote the future development of Corbridge with due respect for its history and the people who live here. We continue to safeguard our village, and we hope that if you live in or close to Corbridge you will join us and support our efforts now and in the future.

One of the Trust's early major projects was to ensure that the 'temporary' steel girder bridge erected alongside the sevenarched **medieval** stone bridge across the Tyne in 1965 was eventually removed.



Preserving Our Heritage ...

Since 1965, the roll-call of projects and campaigns we have undertaken has grown too long to list here, but it includes many successes that are an accepted part of the Corbridge landscape today, and many more that you would not notice: footpaths restored and upgraded, gullies cleared, improvements to green spaces, wastebins provided and the rationalising of traffic flows, parking and signage to name just a few.

Many of our successes have taken years of pressure, fundraising, negotiation and persistent campaigning.

A year after the Trust was established, we joined forces with the Parish Council to modify the plans for the **Crofts Estate**

Development. We persuaded the planners to reduce the density of housing per acre and to change the flat-roof design of the houses to a conventional roof.

Here, it says, Ethelred King of Northumbria was slain in 796, and a Danish King defeated the English and Scots in 918. Corbridge was burned down by William Wallace in 1296 and again by Robert the Bruce in 1312. But the present bridge, built in 1674, was the only bridge along the length of the Tyne to survive the devastating floods of 1771.

In 1966 we also first proposed two more important projects: the need for new playing fields for the village, and floodlighting to show off Corbridge's beautiful church in the heart of the village.

In 1978 a plaque was erected on the pathway to the **Hippingstones Field** to commemorate the medieval rig and furrow system. **Floodlighting St Andrew's Church** took rather longer. Work was completed in 1983.

PROMOTING PRIDE

The Trust has always tried to communicate the importance and fascination of the history all around us.

- Since 1965 we have arranged over 200 talks on history, archaeology, architecture and many other subjects of local interest.
- We have created a series of guided walks around the village, and sold over 40,000 copies of our leaflet: A Walk of Discovery Around Corbridge.
- We have hosted exhibitions of photography of Corbridge past and present.
- We have installed information boards and plaques commemorating historic places and people around the village.

In 1972 we raised the issue of the restoration of the **Old Pottery** and **Bottle Kilns** on Milkwell Lane. Following a visit by the Department of the Environment's Industrial Archaeological Adviser, conservation was secured in 1976.



In 1978 the Trust suggested that Barclays Bank should give the village the tract of land providing access to the riverbank from the Marketplace, now known as **Barclays Garden**.



As a **Millennium** initiative, the Trust commissioned a design to transform **Coign's Corner** from an unattractive waste area where the Walter Willson's shop had once stood, to a peaceful garden at the entrance to Middle Street.

We have consistently encouraged the owners of neglected buildings to restore them and bring them back into full use. Work has recently finished on one of the most notable examples in the **Marketplace**. It has taken 40 years to achieve this landmark success. One of the last 'buildings at risk' is **Bridge Bank Cottage.** We hope that work will begin on this in the near future.



Also In 1972 the Trust made three approaches to the authorities about **flood protection**. We cooperated with the Northumberland & Newcastle Society to negotiate the least obtrusive line for new **pylons** to the north of the village.

And we persuaded the Parish Council to restore the **Cross** and Ball that had been removed 100 years earlier from the **Marketplace Pant**. (A pant is a trough used for watering horses – not a practical facility nowadays but another intriguing historical legacy.)

KEEPING IN TOUCH WITH THE PLANNERS

Behind the visible signs of our activities over the years, the Trust has constantly monitored and frequently challenged the hundreds of planning applications and development proposals that would affect Corbridge.

Developers now increasingly consult the Trust before the planning stage, to allow us to respond to the suitability of their proposed designs.

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WHY WE NEED YOUR SUPPORT...
