Council Notes

The lack of foreign holiday options due to pandemic restrictions means villages like ours will continue to



be busy this summer. It's wonderful to see Corbridge thriving on sunny weekend days with visitors enjoying the river scene, Market Place and our superb range of shops, cafes, pubs and restaurants. The opportunities for people living in urban locations

to enjoy rural Northumberland and to visit historic sites such as Hadrian's Wall and our very own Corbridge Roman Town are valuable in many ways. They give people a pleasant day out and some fresh air but they also help bind our region together as those in urban Tyneside discover their own hinterland. Our village economy partly depends on day trippers spending money in Corbridge and we must balance the inevitable pressures which result with the benefits which accrue to the village itself and to our fellow citizens who travel here.

The recent speed monitoring data from Newcastle Road, Aydon Road and Stagshaw Road show that speeding in the village continues to be a problem. While outrageous breaches of the speed limit are quite rare there is a persistent tendency for drivers to marginally exceed 30mph. Between 22% and 42% of

At the time of writing this the government was due to have ended most Covid restrictions on 19th July. Whatever happens there will be continuing controls



on overseas travel. Many people will take time to adjust to whatever the post-pandemic normality looks like and will be understandably nervous. We can all do our bit by being aware of that and respecting people's concerns. That said it will be great to see some semblance of normality return.

Corbridge will continue to be an attractive destination for visitors and that puts pressure on our infrastructure, but it is also part of what makes our village such a wonderful place to live. We are doing what we can to provide more parking but that continues to be a long term project. There is money in the County Council capital budget for this.

Work is now complete on the mult-million pound Environment Agency project to improve the flood defences at the Devil's Water but the Northumbria Water project to upgrade our sewage pumping station adjacent to the flood defences continues. As a result, our skate park was requisitioned as a compound for this project under statutory powers, but I am optimistic we will benefit from a much improved skate park when it re-opens next year.

I have mentioned this before, but many people are

vehicles breach the limit across these locations with higher average speeds being recorded at weekends. I think our reaction should be to follow the policy adopted in many settlements throughout the country and apply a 20mph limit within the village core. It will take time but we should examine such a solution.

It's encouraging to hear from our Parish Clerk Mandy Senior that bookings at the Parish Hall are recovering well from the pandemic induced shutdown. It's sad to hear that one or two established groups which previously used the Parish Hall may not be re-starting, although we understand the Chess and Bridge clubs intend to resume in the autumn. However, on the positive side there are new activities blossoming such as line dancing combined with pilates together with established activities such as Zumba, art groups, ballet classes and Karate. Some time ago the Parish made a small donation to the Karate Club - surely, we'd have been a very brave Council to resist...

The planned improvements to Corbridge Cemetery are now taking place. The iron gates and railings are being repaired and painted and necessary works of improvement and repair to the paths in certain places have been put in hand. Changes to how the County Council operates its contract may mean that one of the Cemetery Chapels may be able to be opened up in the near future for visitors as a place of prayer and quiet contemplation. We will keep residents informed of this going forward.

Let's look forward to things continuing to open up in the autumn and beyond.

The data from the speed indicator signs confirms this is not just a visitor issue. Much of the speeding is local people putting the safety of their fellow villagers at risk. Slowing down a bit will only add a minute or so to any journey.

Work is progressing well on the new build for our High School in Hexham, a tremendous facility. Planning permission was granted recently for the British Volt car battery plant in Blyth Valley with the potential to be a game changer for the Northumberland economy.

In 2004 I was very proud to receive a prize at Corbridge Village Show and have my '66 replica shirt signed by legend Jack Charlton who was a boyhood hero and is sadly no longer with us. I vowed then only to wear it for semis and finals. It had its third outing for England's Euros Final against Italy. Not the result England fans wanted but well done to Gareth Southgate and his squad on a magnificent achievement in getting to the final.

Corbridge Larder Award

The Corbridge Larder has been named the North East regional winner in the Farm Shop & Deli 2021 Retailer Awards. Owner Jen Horton writes: "We remained 'open' during lockdown by providing a free delivery service to customers both within the village as well as the surrounding area. In addition to our usual produce we added fresh fruit and veg, household products and animal food to try and be a one stop shop for customers who could not get to the supermarket - and there were many. No product was too hard to source. We even managed to keep stock of much needed flour and yeast.

"In addition to this vital service, we worked with local author Louise Ross to provide much needed provisions to NHS key workers who, at the start of lockdown, were faced with empty shelves in supermarkets. Via Facebook we got our followers to nominate key workers for us to surprise with some lovely goodies. And that was just the start. Next we contacted all of the local care homes in and around Corbridge (eight in total), found out how many people worked in each and then delivered bulk provisions to them all to share among themselves. Finally, over a period of two months we delivered weekly groceries to 48 families in deprived areas via their schools to ensure the children got at least one hot meal a day.

We made sure the groceries included treats for the kids as well as ingredients to make nutritious meals. Feedback was that the families loved cooking together, some for the first time, and that we were literally 'lifesavers' with families bursting into tears - so very humbling. Our two co-opted drivers had a great time delivering both to our customers as well as the key workers as they both felt like Santa and had never felt so welcomed.

"When lockdown started to ease we worked with our team every step of the way as our view was that if our staff felt safe at work, our customers would also feel safe coming into the Larder. We moved at their pace and put measures in place that gave them confidence to come to work - especially for the ones we had furloughed as coming back was scary. Our Policy has worked with fantastic feedback from customers saying we take Covid seriously and are one of the best places to come and shop and feel safe. High praise indeed and one we are very proud of. Throughout this whole experience our staff have been amazing. The ones who continued to work through lockdown couldn't do enough for customers and, unlike supermarkets, we were a voice at the end of a phone or a reply on Facebook. We made sure everyone felt important and that they mattered to us, which they do."



Corbridge History: Village Water Supply

Medieval Corbridge had two main sources of water. The spring in Carr's Field and St Andrew's Well.

Carr's Field, now a housing development, was at the eastern end of the village. From the early 13th century, and possibly even from Anglo-Saxon times, water from here was piped to the Market Place. This pipe fell into disuse and was forgotten for over 600 years until it was rediscovered in 1836 when trenches for a new drainage system were being dug. The old system consisted of lengths of ancient two inch bore lead pipes in two foot lengths and strapped at their joints. The original pipe led in front of Low Hall and along the north side of Main and Middle Streets. During this time a second pipe was added to take water from Carr's Field down to what was then the 'Drift' or 'Drove Road' and is now the pant on Spoutwell Lane (presumably for the cattle crossing the, then, nearby ford across the river).



This pant still proves to be a reliable source of water, maintaining a good flow even during times of drought.

St Andrew's Well, located on Well Bank, provided water for people living in the western part of the village.



Aside from a wall plaque, there has been no remaining evidence of this well since 1992 when the area was filled in.

The Princes Street or Birch's Plant was erected in the 1760s by Elezer Birch.



This first pant or drinking fountain in the village still issues water. It proved a useful watering place for draft horses that drew carriages as it was near to the Toll House and was just before the steep pull up to Aydon and the, then, new Military Road.



The Market Place and Main Street Pants were both erected in the early 19th century.

The one in Market Place was given by Hugh Percy, Duke of Northumberland, as the plaque on it records.

The Main Street pant, (right), paid for by public subscription, was erected in 1818. The water for both pants came from the spring in Carr's Field. They are now ornamental features, their troughs filled with flowers.

Two other pants can still be seen. One is opposite The Wheatsheaf Inn (top right, opposite) and is ornamental. The other is further along Stagshaw Road, just north of St Helen's Lane, and provides a trickle of water.

At a meeting held at The Angel Inn in 1884 it was decided to borrow £2000 so that water could be

transferred from the Shaw Well (adjacent to the A68 about one mile north of the village) to those properties whose owners were prepared to pay for it. Following the passing of the 1944 Water Supplies and Sewerage Act, £60,000 was spent providing the village with a clean and reliable supply from the Shaw Well. Today's supply is provided by Northumbrian Water Ltd. Water from the Hallington, Colt Crag and Catcleugh reservoirs is transferred to a large modern treatment works at Whittle Dene some six miles east of Corbridge. It is then piped to the village either under the Aydon Road or via the Shaw Well tank.

Errington Coffee House

Louise Nixon is looking forward to celebrating the third anniversary of The Errington Coffee House. Owner and manager Louise opened the business in autumn 2018. It has since proved a popular venue attracting both locals and visitors Having taken over the former Errington Arms pub, the building - located within the parish of Corbridge at the top of Stagshaw Bank - has been refurbished inside and out, with more improvements on the way.

Originally from Hedley on the Hill, Louise was brought up on the family farm in the Stocksfield area. After leaving school she worked on and off at Hexham Mart for 37 years, including time off with children. Moving to the North Tyne when she was married. Her parents moved to Bolam in the late 1980s and her mother decided to convert an old stable into the Stable Coffee Shop. "She ran it for 25 years. I was there five days a week and loved it, while still working part time at the Mart. Eventually I finished at the Mart at Christmas 2017.

"I started to learn to bake around five years ago when my mother was in ill health. I didn't bake at all before that. I was always an outside person. My mother was a good baker and she used to tell me what to do. And then I just experimented. People who I've known for years can't believe it's me doing the baking. I wanted something nearer home so I telephoned the people at The Errington Arms and asked if they wanted to sell it. The location on the A68 by the Military Road is perfect with plenty of parking. I do most of the baking but I do buy some things in, including from a lovely friend who makes the tray bakes. I'm here until 10 o'clock at night sometimes baking. We're open seven days a week and I am here every day. It means people aren't in doubt about us being open and they are not disappointed to come and find us closed. In general farmers work every day and although it is tiring I love it."

Louise employs around a dozen staff. "We've been busier than ever since reopening after the last lockdown. I'm averaging between 11 and a half and 14 miles a day on my feet. But it's worth it. We meet some lovely walkers, including those walking Hadrian's Wall. A lot of people who used to go to Bolam also come here. And we have some very loyal local customers. We love to see them all."

Corbridge British Legion Centenary

The Corbridge and Wark branches of the Royal British Legion were officially presented with their 100 year anniversary pennants at the Lych Gate war memorial entrance to St Andrew's Church on July 11. The presentation was made by Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Northumberland and acclaimed musician Kathryn Tickell with the pennants blessed by St Andrew's vicar David Kennedy. Standard bearers were present from the Corbridge, Wark and Prudhoe branches along with piper Jim Hall and others. The ceremony was covered by a film crew working for the Royal British Legion. The centenary of the Corbridge branch was also marked on June 13 - exactly 100 years to the day since it was formed in 1921 - with a ceremony and wreath laving inside St Andrew's Church.



Corbridge Middle School News

In December last year almost 180 pupils from Years 5 and 6 took part in a challenge set by The Advanced Propulsion Centre UK on "How will we travel in the year 2050?". The resulting designs ranged from hydrogen-fuelled submarines and floating houses to nuclear rockets and horse drawn vehicles. The inschool winner was Olin from class 6W with a design called 'EV-F (Environmentally Friendly Travel) tube train' which can be called via an app and powered by above ground solar panels. Olin's design was then sent to Newcastle University's School of Engineering for a chance to win a GreenPower Goblin electric kit car. We were delighted that Olin was announced as the winner of the car. Olin's class, with a little help from their teacher and some online help from Newcastle University technicians, then managed to build their own electric racing car within their science lessons - this linked really well to the topic of electricity. Corbridge Middle School pupils learn about the UN sustainable development goals (SDGs) across the curriculum. This project links incredibly well to the SDG9: Industry, Innovation and Infrastructure and SDG13: Climate Action. The use of electric vehicles, which are not powered by fossil fuels, is something that our young pupils are becoming increasingly familiar with as they prepare for the future. The kit car will be dismantled at the end of the year and used again. The school yard made the perfect racetrack and some impressive times were recorded. The team then competed in the Sunderland regional race with other opponents from across the area. They topped the leaderboard and won the overall race in Sunderland last month.







It was great to see Bikeability (cycle training programme) return to school. Bikeability helps pupils gain practical cycling skills and an understanding of how to cycle on today's roads. Underpinned by the National Standard for cycle training; a government-recognised set of principles, Bikeability is currently being offered to our Year 5 pupils and is delivered by professional instructors. We have had a great uptake and have delivered almost three weeks of training for our Year 5 pupils.



Earlier this term we welcomed back into school illustrator and author of children's books Liz Million. Throughout the day, children in all year groups had a wonderful time learning the techniques to help them create incredible drawings... inspired by listening to her stories. She is an enthusiastic speaker who had her audience gripped.





Some of our Year 7 classes have taken part in the Kids4Change program with Newcastle University Water Hub during their Enrichment Project on Friday afternoon. The first 2 weeks were spent on learning about the Sustainable Development Goals. Pupils had to design SDG superheroes and have learnt about fashion and climate change. They used VR sets and water pollution kits. Did you know that it takes over 10000L to make a hoodie? This is the equivalent of 15 years of drinking water for a human. The academics from Newcastle University Water Hub have said they had a fantastic time with class 7C during the enrichment project this term. The multinational team shared their love of the planet, their expertise in varying fields (soils, water, fashion, storytelling), and learned alongside the class. To have the sessions ending with a 'chat' with James Honeybourne was incredible and 7C certainly did the school proud. The pupils showed their deep understanding of the topics they had covered and a huge amount of enthusiasm when talking about the change they were making.

Jojo Maddison, Tynedale Head of Physiotherapy, said, "We have worked with Dr David Millar and his colleagues for a while now, mainly with the 1st team squad, and have been overwhelmed by the knowledge and expertise this brings. At Tynedale Rugby Club we

have always taken player welfare very seriously and although we have always had extensive concussion protocols I am very excited to implement this new progressive partnership. Regardless of age or gender, every Tynedale player involved in the contact game will have access to the best clinical support available in rugby. This initiative doesn't just provide structured support to my physiotherapy team to make robust clinical decisions but also gives confidence to the coaching staff and parents that the players' welfare is at the forefront."

The partnership will be launching ready for the 2021-2022 season and all players, coaches and parents will be provided with further detail before the start of the season.
