Council Notes

Many of us are looking forward to celebrating the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. Everyone is welcome to come along to the Parish Hall on Saturday June 4th between 2pm and 4:30pm for tea and cakes. Only the finest quality jams will be served together with some home made scones. I hope the weather gods will be kind to us and we will have a memorable day honouring Queen Elizabeth's service to our country. The Parish Council also plans to create a new community woodland in the wider Corbridge parish area dedicated to Her Majesty along with a Platinum Jubilee tree in the grounds of the Parish Hall.

In other parts of Europe some people are facing the most difficult challenges. At the time of writing, many Ukrainian refugees have arrived in the UK as part of various government schemes. Some have come to Corbridge and we expect more to follow. Councillor Nick Oliver and I recently met a local resident who is assisting friends fleeing the conflict to try to help with contacts and links with our local services. Representatives of other refugee organistions attended the April Parish Council meeting and preparations are being made. We will do all we can to help those in need and to give people sanctuary and security.

On more basic village matters, there are a couple of traffic matters I need to mention. First, a number of residents have asked me to point out that southbound traffic in Princes Street passing the east side of The Golden Lion is not permitted to turn right into Hill Street. There is a tendency at this junction for people to turn into the parking bays which, to some motorists, seem just too tempting to resist. In fact, anyone wishing to use the parking spaces in front of the Coop railings must drive the loop into Middle Street and turn into Hill Street in the proper way. I understand that the pressure to obtain a parking space in the centre of the village is sometimes intense but the no right turn sign is there for a reason.

The second traffic issue concerns the tendency for people to 'fly park' on the double yellow lines outside the Coop in Hill Street opposite JD Hall's butchers. This is becoming an absolute menace. Stationary cars in that position present a potential hazard to pedestrians and also conflict with deliveries to local shops. Part of the problem is that once one person starts parking there others copy. I put forward a suggestion which

may potentially correct this problem at our recent Parish Council meeting and asked County Councillor Nick Oliver to speak with officers in the Highways Department. One way or another this problem must be solved.

The Northumberland Local Plan was recently adopted by the county council and I thought it may be of interest to suggest what this might mean for Corbridge. When I first became a councillor in 2017 there was a Local Plan on the table which would have meant significant development in the Northumberland Green Belt and irrevocable damage to the special character of our county. We pulled that plan and resubmitted a new proposal to government that is ambitious for economic growth but also protects our Green Belt and reduces the number of houses to be built to match the actual needs of our county.

That plan together with the National Planning Policy Framework now forms the basis of planning policy for Northumberland's strategic planning and for consideration of all local planning applications. In the plan Corbridge is designated as a "service centre" along with places like Allendale, Bellingham and Seahouses. The plan has no impact on the Conservation Area status of parts of our village and says Corbridge "....is a village of great historic and architectural significance. It has a commuter housing role but also is an important service centre, which provides services to a wider rural area. It looks to Hexham for its higher services. The village is surrounded by the Green Belt".

The strategic approach to preserving Green Belt singles out Corbridge for special mention - "Preserve the setting and special character of Hexham, Corbridge and Morpeth". The plan also mentions that constraints on planning in Corbridge mean that we are likely to look to Hexham for provision of 'employment land'.

The plan is also required to publish indicative housing requirements for the period 2016 to 2036 and for Corbridge this number is 200. In 2016 planning permission was granted for the Milkwell Development now known as Roman Fields and Stanegate Manor, which means that 188 of our allocation of 200 has already been given permission. With some of those new homes already built and the rest in the process of construction

This plan is a significant piece of work by the planning policy team at County Hall and they should be congratulated for balancing the disparate needs of all of our communities. I'm also pleased to see

that our historic Corbridge Market Place features on the cover.

Textile and Art Exhibition

Corbridge Sewing Bee and St Andrew's Church are busy planning a two-day Textile and Art Exhibition to be held on Thursday June 23 (9am to 8.30pm) and Friday June 24 (9am to 4pm). It will be the first exhibition of its kind at the church in recent times and aims to provide an exciting opportunity for informal makers in the local community to showcase their work.

The idea emerged from members of the Corbridge Sewing Bee, a group of individuals with a passion for working with a range of textiles who meet regularly throughout the year in the pavilion at Corbridge Cricket Club. With a wide range of experience in sewing, knitting, quilting, weaving, embroidery, crochet and rug making. Sewing Bee members were seeking a way to bring together the wealth of creativity that exists in other local groups and the idea of an exhibition was born.

In looking for a suitable venue, the group were delighted to be offered the use of St Andrew's Church with the first day of the exhibition coinciding with the Corbridge Midsummer's Evening event. Linda Hunter, Lay Minister from St Andrew's, has been instrumental in putting together the arrangements for the exhibition and is keen to see an exhibition of this kind become a regular feature in Corbridge.

She explained: "As a person who enjoys a range of textile activities myself, I am delighted to work with the Sewing Bee to enable the exhibition to happen in St. Andrew's. As a church we are always keen to support new projects and work with community groups and organisations to enable them to happen. We do hope that you will come along and support the exhibition and see the originality and creativity of all who are exhibiting."

Apart from the work of the Sewing Bee the exhibition will feature displays from Sew Fab, Corbridge Embroidery Group, Corbridge Lace Group and Corbridge Art Club. Individual artists and crafters working locally have agreed to display their work as well so that visitors will enjoy the full range of local creativity. A series of textile craft demonstrations will take place throughout the two days so that visitors can see work being undertaken at first hand.

Important contributions from local organisations that encourage the development of textile art will also feature including Corbridge Youth Initiative, Charlotte Straker Craft Group, Coria, the Brownies and local schools. Indeed, the exhibition will highlight local textile and art activity as a significant benefit for the community from sewing scrubs for care workers during the pandemic, displaying art in front windows for residents to enjoy throughout lockdown to producing hand-crafted items to raise money for the Charlotte Straker Trust.



Tea, coffee and biscuits will be available throughout the exhibition. If you are interested in helping in any way, please do go and sign up on the list in St. Andrew's Church. A preview evening will be held on Wednesday June 22 between 7pm and 8pm. Tickets at £5 (to include a glass of wine) are available from St Andrew's Church and Forum Books. Entry to the exhibition will be free with all proceeds and donations shared equally between the church and the Charlotte Straker Trust.



Corbridge Roman Bridge

A new replacement information sign is now in place at the site of the Roman Bridge remains on the south side of the river some half a mile west of today's bridge over the Tyne at Corbridge. The Roman bridge was 350 metres west of where the remains have been placed, having been built near the confluence of the Cor Burn and River Tyne.

The bridge carried the North-South Dere Street from York over the river by the Corbridge Roman Town civilian settlement and then crossed with the East-West Stanegate linking the forts along Hadrian's Wall. As ever, the Romans knew a thing or two about choosing the right location. Their bridge was originally made of timber and by AD 160 of stone. It is believed to have had up to 11 arches and stood some 25 to 33 feet above the river level.

The fragment of walling re-erected at today's riverside site was part of a huge stone ramp taking the Roman road up to the carriageway of the bridge with the road ramp approaching the bridge along the river bank. After the Roman period, part of the road ramp was undermined by the river and collapsed. The bridge could no longer be used and - the sign reports - some of its stonework was removed in the AD 670s to build St Wilfred's great church at Hexham - later built up over time and now the site of Hexham Abbey. Robert Forster's 'History of Corbridge' states that a number of other bridge stones were taken for use at Dilston.

Movement in the course of the river threatened to destroy the remains of the bridge wall left at Corbridge, which were exposed on the river bank. So following an archaeological excavation in 2004, the blocks were recorded and then removed and re-assembled on today's site where they are safe from damage by the river. When the water level is low enough, large stone blocks can still be seen in the river near the bank marking the site of the Roman bridge.

In recent times there have been calls for a 'new' Roman bridge to be built. This would be a pedestrian bridge linking the south of the river with the Roman Town at or near the site of the original bridge, also creating a new circular Corbridge walk with two bridge crossings. This year's Hadrian's Wall 1900 anniversary has sparked renewed interest in the idea.




