

## Council NOTES



I am delighted to report that at its October meeting the Parish Council made an unequivocal commitment to support the development of the 3G football pitch at Corbridge Middle School. The vote was unanimous. It was made on behalf of and to represent the wider

community of Corbridge which was promised this pitch some years ago as a result of the large scale new housing development nearby. Indeed, the housing developers transferred a financial payment of nearly £500,000 towards the costs of developing the pitch which remains on deposit at Northumberland County Council. It is high time that the scheme is commenced and completed without any further delay. Both Cllr Nick Oliver and I believe that at a time when young people are spending hours and hours on their smartphones and others devices it is vital that we provide an opportunity for them to play sport - with all of the health and social benefits that it brings. Furthermore, many of our local sports clubs - such as Corbridge United Football Club and Tynedale Rugby Club - would benefit from an all weather facility to train young players, especially in the winter months. Corbridge was promised this 3G pitch. It must be provided. The Parish Council has given its support to a fixed point photography scheme organised by Tyne Rivers Trust. The principle behind the project is to set up specific locations to enable photographs to be taken to monitor, store and record changes in landscapes, vegetation and habitat throughout the months and years. Variations in river flow can also be identified as well as any bankside erosion. The intention is that such fixed point photography positions will be set up in many locations throughout the Tyne Valley. The Council felt that we should do our bit by supporting the scheme within our Parish. As the hot and largely dry summer fades into memory and we progress into winter many of you will have been aware of the bumper apple harvest from our local trees. I can't recall any year which has produced so much fruit. Acorns and conkers are also abundant. Corbridge Community Partnership's apple juice and sparkling cider project has enjoyed this harvest and its products are now available - with sales supporting local charities including the Corbridge Youth Initiative and the Charlotte Straker Project. (See Pages 12 & 13) If it's as good as last year it'll be very good indeed.

William Clouston Corbridge Parish Council Chairman Welcome to the final issue of Corbridge Matters in 2025 and I hope everybody has an enjoyable Christmas. William has updated us on progress with the planning application to improve the Market Place in his column previously. On a related matter I have been asked



about the tables and chairs outside Grants and the status of the Market Place. The Market Place is controlled by the Parish Council under a Scheme of Management made under the Commons Act of 1899 and any future improvements to the Market Place will be made under this Act. Some time ago the Parish Council were approached by Grants to put chairs and tables out, consulted a highways engineer and then agreed to this on an annual license. That strip of land with Grants tables and Stobos fruit and vegetables display is not public highway and both businesses are important to the vibrancy of the village. A few residents have questioned why other businesses have not had the same opportunity. The Parish Council would try to support any reasonable request not on a public highway from a business in the Market Place on areas immediately adjacent to their property. There are currently three public highways through the Market Place onto Watling Street. From Middle Street past the Lych Gate, from Front Street through the centre and from Front Street past the old Barclays Bank and Tea & Tipple. The aim is to reduce that to two. There have been increasing instances of shoplifting in the village and the Parish Council has agreed to support the traders in their efforts to have some CCTV in public areas to complement the CCTV many businesses have in their own premises. How this might be done is currently being explored. Following requests from residents the Parish Council has recently asked their handyman Andrew to clear the steps on the north east side of the bridge so that residents can access the right of way along the riverfront east of the bridge. I have also recently been exploring again whether it might be possible to create a new footpath to Riding Mill along the river. I'm afraid to report that this is looking very unlikely because of restrictions on what can be done near a railway line. I'm having one last attempt and will report back in the next issue.

## **Charlotte Straker Fete**

Despite the rain the annual fete - held later this year on September 20th - was an inspiring event which raised over £2000 to help support work the Charlotte Straker Project does both with their residents and in the local community. With the event opened by Visit Corbridge chair Gayle Foster, owner of Vintage at the Tower, who won the national 'High Street Street Hero' award in May. Charlotte Straker chair Berenice Groves said: "It was a truly lovely afternoon filled with laughter, community spirit and great singing thanks to Charlie's Choir. Guests tried to stay dry under the many shelters while enjoying afternoon tea with cake and scones, buying freshly baked cakes plus a packed tombola and plenty of games, including our popular Human Fruit Machine.









This month marks the 10th anniversary of Corbridge's worst recorded flood which happened on December 5th 2015. (The images on this page show some of the photos at the Corbridge Heritage Centre in Princes Street) Storm Desmond gave a record breaking 150mm of rain, one and a half months' worth in 24 hours, arriving from over the Pennines. Which led to the river rising to 5.76 meters (nearly 19 feet). Although this was believed to be marginally lower than the Great Flood of 1771 which swept away all the bridges in the Tyne Valley except that at Corbridge, it caused far more disruption to everyday life. Whereas in 1771 there was only one house south of the river to be flooded, by 2015 there were 45 in Station Road and The Stanners. With water rising rapidly to up to seven feet in some houses, many residents failed to evacuate in time and had to be rescued from upstairs windows. They were unable to return to their homes for up to a year while their houses dried out and were repaired. West of the bridge, water overtopped the concrete wall intended to protect the nearby houses and embankment by the cricket and rugby grounds, seriously damaging

both their pavilions (it nearly reached the cross bars of the rugby posts). East of the bridge the embankment held but water from the Devils Water could not escape into the overfull River Tyne and so flowed behind it and over Dilston Haughs. Consequently it overturned gravestones in the cemetery before severely damaging the allotments and submerging cars and depositing large amounts of debris in the car park south of the bridge. Yet somehow the council and others managed to clear the area in time for Corbridge's Late Night Christmas Shopping event just two days later. They say nature always has a sting in its tail and so it proved when three days of rain from the subsequent Storm Eva some three weeks after Storm Desmond caused a landslip at Farnley which fractured the pipe carrying waste water and sewage to Riding Mill and closed the Tyne Valley railway line there for a month. Also blocking the riverside walk linking Corbridge and Riding Mill which, despite many efforts, has not been restored due to safety issues. Not least involving those related to proximity to the rail line.

## **Lest We Forget**



Members of the Royal British Legion Corbridge branch again led the local Poppy Appeal this year, including at the Lych Gate war memorial entrance to St Andrew's Church. Ahead of the Remembrance Sunday parade through Corbridge and Civic Service of Remembrance at the church. Photos from that day will appear in the next (February 2026) edition. On VE Day 80 this year branch secretary Stuart Robinson and his brother Dudley laid a wreath on the grave of Major David Barnett (The Northumberland Hussars) from Halton at the Souda Bay cemetery in Crete. A member of the Anti-Tank Regiment, Royal Artillery, he was killed on May 20th 1941 at the age of 39. Then in September members laid a wreath on behalf of the branch on the grave of Private Charles Frederick Best (Parachute Regiment) from Corbridge at the Arnhem Oosterbeek War Cemetery in the Netherlands. A member of the Army Air Corps, he was killed on September 28th 1944 at the age of 24 in further fighting after the Allied Operation Market Garden. Corbridge survivor Harry Minto, whose story was told in the October 2024 edition of Corbridge Matters, was also remembered during the visit.



## Corbridge Apple Juice


The 2025 Corbridge Apple Juice charity project has been, yet again, another wonderful community endeavour. From the donation and collection of apples to the Apple Pressing Weekend at Corbridge Cricket Club in October and subsequent production plus sales effort. With thanks to all involved. Including the team who worked tirelessly in the week leading up to the pressing to pick, collect and transport apples across Corbridge. Most of those volunteers also helping out over the weekend. Along with those who donated apples, drove vans, carried orchard ladders, provided food and drink (including Grants Bakery) for the team of volunteers and performed any number of other tasks. With thanks also to Hadrian Border Brewery for their invaluable help. And to Corbridge Cricket Club for hosting and much more. Some 2000 litres of apple juice was transported to Stu Brew at Newcastle University for processing into the 2025 supplies of Corbridge Sparkling Apple Juice and Corbridge Sparkling Cider. Then onward to the Allendale Brewery where it was canned and labelled prior to going on sale. Proceeds of this Corbridge Community Partnership project will go to The Charlotte Straker Project, Corbridge Youth Initiative and the Corbridge Community Partnership. The 2024 apple juice project raised a grand total of £10,500 which was split between the three charities. This is a truly heartwarming project involving our Corbridge community. Collecting thousands of apples that might otherwise never be eaten or used to provide both delicious end products and much needed funds for local good causes.

Corbridge Sparkling Apple Juice and Corbridge Sparkling Cider will be on sale in Market Place (while stocks last) during the St Andrew's Church Christmas Tree Festival, including the late night Monday opening. And then again on Saturdays leading up to Christmas plus at other selected times. All prices remain the same as last year: 330ml cans of the Apple Juice cost £2.50 each / £10 for a box of four / £15 for a carrier of six / £30 for a box of 12. 330ml cans of the Cider cost £3.50 each / £14 for a box of four / £21 for a carrier of six / £42 for a box of 12. Free delivery is also available within a five mile radius of Corbridge for purchases of a box of 12 cans or more. 






Also out are brilliant new books from **Bob Mortimer**, **Philippa Gregory**, Richard Osman and Ann Cleeves. But let me mention others you'll love too. **Snö** is a beautiful and profound natural history of snow from the bestselling Swedish environmentalist **Sverker Sörlin**.
